He will demonstrate how to decipher Chinese characters, which are based not on alphabets but abstract graphs.

LECTURE 2: The Aesthetics




Dr. SuiWah Chan is Professor Emeritus at the College of Human Medicine at Michigan State University, and an associate of the Confucius Institute and China Mirror Project at the University of Michigan. He is a practicing calligrapher and teaches Chinese writing, as part of *China Odyssey*, a graduate course on Chinese cultural history. He is currently producing new tools, methods and mobile applications for teaching and learning Chinese writing.

He is a Professor and Director of the Institute of Ancient Texts at the Academy of Social Sciences in Xian, Shaanxi province, His works are widely published in China.
